## Dear Friends

St. Francis, one of the most well-loved and renowned figures in Christian history is remembered this month on 4<sup>th</sup> October. Echoing his love of animals and all creation, I am delighted to say that – Covid-19 regulations permitting - we will be holding a **Blessing of Animals Service on 18<sup>th</sup> October** – I would call it a Pet Service, but I'm really hoping we might get some animals along that can't strictly be categorised as pets e.g. horses, chickens etc., and I didn't want them to feel unwelcome!

It will take place outside at Lowe Farm , Clipston Road, Sibbertoft LE16 9UB – I am hugely grateful to Carolyne and Alex Robinson for hosting it. **All are welcome with or without accompanying animals**, so do come along – bring your own refreshments and a chair if you'd like to.

Well known as he is for his care and celebration of the natural world, St. Francis is also a wonderful example of transformation and change, turning from a superficial, meandering life, to one of depth and purpose.

Francis was a renowned party animal in his youth, well known for his love of celebrations and revelry. Even a year spent as a prisoner during a border dispute between Assisi and Perugia, failed to halt his party-loving life-style. Who knows, though, what seeds of discontent were stirring, for after a long period of ill-health and another stint in the army, he began to tire of his somewhat shallow existence. He went on pilgrimage to Rome, and was deeply affected by the beggars whom he met there. At that time, he was working in his father's successful cloth business, but when he got back from Rome he resigned, and put his high-living (and high-living friends) behind him. Perhaps unsurprisingly his father was not pleased, particularly as Francis stole a bag of cloth, sold it, and used the proceeds to repair churches.

It was when working on a church, that he heard Jesus speaking to him directly through Scripture, telling him that he had to leave everything and follow him. Francis' life changed radically from excess to simplicity, from party-going fame, to fame as a man of integrity, simplicity and charity.

Around him gathered a group of followers, attracted by his preaching, peaceful purpose, and renunciation of personal possessions. They gradually formed into a religious order and, as the order grew, Francis divided it into districts, appointing others to be in charge. By the time of his death in 1226, there was a men's order, a women's order (instituted by St. Clare, who had heard Francis preaching), and a lay order. He had a huge impact in his life-time, and that impact has not diminished.

How much we can learn from Francis, how much we can be inspired by him. He turned to God and allowed God to transform him, and his life, utterly. We may not be able to make the same radical change (although that should never be discounted) but even little steps, small changes, help us to focus on what matters, on the deep purposes of existence – things like compassion, generosity, faithfulness - rather than the shiny, slippery surface of celebrity.

As St. Francis himself prayed so, too, can we:

*Most High, Glorious God,  
enlighten the darkness of our minds.*

*Give us a right faith,  
a firm hope*

*and perfect charity,*

*so that we may always*

*and in all things*

*act according to your Holy Will.*

*Amen-*

## **Remembrance Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> November 2020 Welford**

**Because of present circumstances and the resultant restrictions this years' Service of Remembrance at Welford on Sunday 8<sup>th</sup> November will have to be different.**

**As things stand it will be impossible to accommodate the 200 plus people who have attended in previous years, and it is therefore proposed to hold a much shorter service outside, at the War Memorial starting at 10.45am.**

**In order to maintain social distancing, in addition to standing in the road, you can stand in the churchyard around the War Memorial. Masks may also be worn if you wish to do so. The Royal British Legion will not be selling poppies this year, but it's work and commitments continue, so there will be an offertory plate located by the church gate.**

## Alfred the Great



King of the southern Anglo-Saxon kingdom of Wessex and one of the outstanding figures of English history, as much for his social and educational reforms as for his military successes against the Danes. He is the only English monarch known as 'the Great'

In 886 AD, Alfred negotiated a treaty with the Danes.

England was divided, with the north and the east declared to be Danish territory and Alfred gained control of areas of West Mercia and Kent which had been beyond the boundaries of Wessex.

Alfred built up the defences of his kingdom to ensure that it was not threatened by the Danes again. He reorganised his army and built a series of well-defended settlements across southern England. He also established a navy for use against the Danish raiders who continued to harass the coast.

As an administrator Alfred advocated justice and order and established a code of laws and a reformed coinage. He had a strong belief in the importance of education and learnt Latin in his late thirties. He then took part in, the translation of books from Latin to Anglo-Saxon.

By the 890s, Alfred's charters and coinage were referring to him as 'king of the English'. He died in October 899 AD and was buried at his capital city of Winchester.
