As the restrictions ease we do hope to be able to see more members of our church family face to face!



Dear Friends,

As I write this, things are looking very much more encouraging as Covid-19 restrictions are relaxed, and we can begin to meet with family and friends more easily. It has been a long haul and, whilst we are certainly not completely out of the woods, it looks as though the summer will, indeed, be a time of increasing freedom.

We are made for relationship, and we have missed the opportunities to live out our relationships in physical ways. What a joy it will be to once more be free to meet together in fellowship, in worship, in friendship – even, perhaps, to hug one another! How much we have missed the choice to share our lives with others, to speak face to face, to have that vital physical contact, however slight, however intimate. And yet, by God's grace, these same challenges have actually deepened and rekindled our understanding of community, our responsibility to neighbours, and our need for one another.

So it is, then, my hope and prayer that as we begin to exercise our longed-for freedoms, we will not let go of the sense of community that has developed, and will recognise that, as many of us welcome these renewed freedoms, there will be some who find them fearful and worrying. We have become accustomed to the limitations imposed upon us, and equate them with safety and security – which, indeed, they have been and, to varying degrees, will continue to be. For some, stepping beyond those familiar restrictions will be difficult, and we need to work sensitively in ensuring that the right level of encouragement and support is offered, whilst at the same time acknowledging the reality of any concerns.

God goes before us, leading us gently and compassionately into a new and hopeful future, but we mustn't rush ahead heedlessly. If we know of anyone who is being left behind as we step out, let us not forget them. Rather, let us recall that Christ is the Good Shepherd, and we are his body here on earth, his hands and feet, speaking his words, and hearing, with him, the cries of those in need. In the power of the Holy Spirit, Christ asks us to search for every single sheep that is lost and bring them with us, that we may be one flock in one fold, secure in God's love.

Members were reminded of various forthcoming events organised by the Federation. The speaker, Paul Howard, gave a very interesting talk on his career as a freelance press photographer. As well as providing photographs for the National Press, many were for the local press and as he was born, raised and still lives in Towcester. there was a lot of local interest. His 40 years of photographs also provided a fascinating social history. Samuel and Henrietta Barnett Social Reformers

Henrietta was born into a comfortable family in 1851. In 1869 she moved to Bayswater where she became involved in parish visiting, and committed herself to the housing reformer, Octavia Hill. Through her work with Octavia she met Samuel, then curate of St. Mary's, Bryanston Square. After their marriage they went to live in the troubled and deprived parish of St. Jude's, Whitechapel. They both sought to improve housing, education and opportunities for the poor. Henrietta took a particular interest in women's interests, including finding job opportunities for the many prostitutes in the

Together they founded Toynbee Hall, where Oxbridge graduates were encouraged to live, work and educate the very poor. Using their experience to develop practical solutions later in national life.

Amongst those who did so were Clement Attlee and William

Beverage. The foundation is still active today.

Henrietta became a woman guardian and school manager for the poor law district in Forrest Gate as well as many other issues including the provision of country holidays for local slum children. In later life she concentrated upon creating the Hampstead Garden suburb. A community that was organic, mixed and that had housing and social amenities that allowed a heathy life for all.
