

Dear Friends.



That traditional topic of conversation for everyone who lives and visits this country – the weather – has taken on a new and fresh perspective as we find ourselves experiencing unexpected patterns of sun, rain and temperature.

Whereas once we had a rough idea of the sort of weather we could expect at different times of year, climate change has had such an impact that I am not sure we can necessarily still call autumn the season of mists and mellow fruitfulness. Hopefully, this year, though, we will know something of that peaceful beauty and tranquillity.

If I was a farmer, or someone else whose work was weather-dependent, I am sure I would think very differently but, as it is, I do find some benefits in unpredictable weather – having spent 9 months in California a while ago, I have to say I got rather bored of constant blue skies and warm temperatures. I, for one, appreciate the sunshine so much more when it's something of an unexpected treat!

I guess that's a bit like our appreciation of God's love — when life's going well and, metaphorically speaking, the skies are blue and the days are warm, God's love can easily be taken for granted. When life becomes unpredictable, when we don't know what the mornings will bring, when hopes are dashed, when we long to feel cherished and cared about, when we long to know that the creator of all things has noticed what is going on in our lives, and cares - in these situations, God's love can be like the sun breaking through after a stretch of interminably grey days.

But, actually, to compare God's love to the sun is to diminish it immeasurably. Of course, as we know, the light and warmth of the sun is always there — it's just that 'there' is not always where we are — when it's shining on friends in Australia, it's not shining in Northamptonshire!

God's love, too, is always there but, in his case, 'there' is <u>always</u> where we are. There's no night-time to his love, it's not limited by the turning of the earth, or the changing of the seasons; his love is constant, not affected by solar storms, sunspots, or decay. There is nothing that can separate us from the love of God – apart, that is, from our blindness in perceiving it, and our unwillingness to receive it.
