

Dear Friends

No doubt most of you will be very busy over the coming weeks – our lives often become more complicated as Christmas draws ever closer, its approach seeming to accelerate day by day!

A few of us may look back to the early days of the first lockdown almost with a sense of nostalgia as we recall that we had time to look around and appreciate our surroundings. For many others, of course, the memories will be quite the reverse, with tension building, risks growing, and isolation deepening. Whatever our memories, though, most of us will be able to point to an unexpected act of kindness or compassion that helped us to cope in difficult times. As I have observed before, our communities came together in all sorts of wonderful ways but, of course, they could not come together in a physical, face to face sense. Groups, if they met, met virtually, or kept in touch by phone or other means — contact of a kind continued, but how we missed the reality of one another!

This year, it is my hope that we will be able to celebrate the reality of loved ones at Christmas – but it is also my hope that we will be able to celebrate the reality of God. For God has met us face to face in Jesus. There was nothing virtual about the baby born in Bethlehem, he was as real as we are. And that baby grew up to tell us that we are his brothers and sisters, each of us a child of God, and that we belong together – and, more than that, we are one in Christ.

During 2020 and 2021, our lives have been diminished by the lack of contact we have had with friends and family, yet how much more are our lives diminished by our lack of contact with God. We belong together and, without him as part of our lives, we lack a richness, a depth of meaning, direction and purpose.

To know that undergirding everything is unfailing, creative love is life changing. It is transformational to recognise that at the heart of all that is known and unknown is God's love. All creation springs from it, and remains wholly within its embrace, yet how easy it is to obscure it with fear or cynicism, denial or derision. Nevertheless, if we are prepared to open our eyes to it, it is love that we see in the world around us, and love that we meet face to face in one another. Our purpose in life is to live out and share God's love — it is as simple as that.

So, this Christmas, I hope you will truly know God's presence, that you will open your hearts and accept the greatest of all gifts, the gift of love.

That gift will be celebrated at many services across the Benefice, and we would love to make you welcome, and share God's peace and joy.

Royal British Legion

A very poignant short service took place in Sibbertoft church on Sunday 24 October – Laying Up of the Clipston and District Standard of the Royal British Legion. This means that the Clipston branch has now closed but the annual Poppy house to house collection will still continue, looked after by Paul Jervis of Naseby. Daryl Robinson, branch chairman, carried the standard to the chancel, Andy Blake sounded the Last Post as the standard was dipped and the 2 minutes silence observed.

Reveille sounded and Rupert Ellenborough committed the standard into the safe keeping of the vicar, Rev Canon Miranda Hayes, "in this holy place for evermore". Sibbertoft church was chosen as the final resting place of the standard in honour of 2 ex service men who lived in the village and represented the RBL – Basil Eckhard and Tony Elliott.

Basil was a captain in the Royal East Kent Regiment, "The Buffs" and volunteered for special service with 2 SBS. He was mentioned in despatches for his work on Operation Torch and also given a King's Commendation.

Lt. Col G A Elliott was awarded the Military Cross whilst on active duty in Borneo with the SAS in the early 60s and after leaving the Army served in his regiment's territorial unit.Both very brave men.

Unfortunately we will not be marching down from the Bull's Head anymore but I would like to thank Steve and Helen for providing us with very welcome coffee over the years, and all village Poppy collectors – you will still be needed! Rose Anderson
