Dear Friends,

In April, we find ourselves pitched into Passiontide and then the events of Holy Week, beginning on Palm Sunday – the day when we recall Jesus’ entry into Jerusalem on a young donkey, with all the attendant joyful excitement, cheering crowds, and waving of palm branches. Yet, how humble and vulnerable a king – what a contrast to earthly power and exploitation, to rumbling tanks and screaming missiles. How potent a challenge to worldly actions and expectations, and what a powerful statement of intent.

We move on through that momentous week, as throngs of Jews gather in Jerusalem for the Festival of the Passover; on Maundy Thursday, we are brought face to face with the cost of love, as Judas disappears into the night to betray Jesus, and sets in train an unstoppable sequence of events. Yet it is now that Jesus - aware of all that is going on - gives his disciples a new commandment: that we love one another, as he loves us. And having given that commandment, he lives out its meaning. He begins by washing his disciples’ feet and by distributing bread and wine in token of his death and of his eternal, abiding presence. And then he walks out into the night – not to betray as Judas does, but to passionate, faithful, loving obedience - even to death on the cross.

Against this backdrop and example, how clearly we see the fickleness of our own human nature. How quickly the joyful excitement of Palm Sunday turns to anger and fear, how quickly the cheering turns to jeering, and how quickly the waving palm branches turn to shaking fists.....

What darkness and desolation we encounter on Good Friday, how grey and hopeless is Easter Eve.

What a loveless and violent world we find when we turn our backs on God and deny his presence.

Then the light dawns on Easter Day, and we find the ashes of our despair turn to the unquenchable, burning fire of resurrection. Perfect love has overcome sin and death - those two unending consequences of our own, imperfect, love.

Easter is the defining moment of our Christian faith - we are an Easter people. Our lives are renewed and transformed by the resurrection life of Jesus Christ: in him, we are a new creation.

What joy to know that, despite ourselves, and however much we rail against him, hate him, and deny him, God will always be faithful to us, and his love for us will never fail. In the power of the Spirit he invites us to live transformed lives - lives that reflect the eternal light of Christ, and witness to his love.

"I give you a new commandment, that you love one another. Just as I have loved you, you also should love one another."
