Dear Friends

Some three and a half years have passed since I came to these seven parishes and helped in their shaping into one united Benefice. What a wonderful area of the world it has proved to be, and what wonderful people I have encountered. Now, though, the time has come for me to move on and take up a new role in Sheffield Diocese. My last service here will be on 30th October.

Much has happened in my time here, and it has been my privilege to travel with you through the challenges and difficulties we have all experienced.

It has been a happy time, but it would be foolish to pretend that the time has been spent in communities untroubled and untouched by differences of opinion, grief or loss but, then, what community is ever wholly immune from such experiences? After all, they go hand in hand with the joys and challenges of living in relationship, and relationship is an inevitable consequence of being human. As John Donne said, in a quote I have used before, *“No man is an Island, entire of itself; every man is a piece of the Continent, a part of the main;”*

Yes, each of us is a unique individual, but we are more than that, through our relationship with others. Every one of us is the product of relationship – foundationally that with God, subsequently that between father and mother. So we have no choice at all in whether or not we have relationships, but what we do have choice in is the nature of those relationships, how they are lived out, how they are experienced. So what does good relationship look like? Well, God, actually! In the Trinity - Father, Son and Holy Spirit - we see relationship lived in perfect love. This is a wonderful thing, but even more wonderful is the fact that perfect relationship is neither insular nor finite, neither static nor sterile - but rather dynamically creative, and infinitely self-giving. And it is by virtue of these same characteristics that we are able to learn about perfect relationship for ourselves - from the ‘inside’.

How can that be? Because we are held within that infinite love – love which initially brought us into being, sustains us day by day, and will never give up on us. Whatever divisions we may make for ourselves, whatever barriers we may place in God’s way, however much we may deny him, God will never forget us, never deny us, never lose sight of us. So, as perfect relationship goes, it’s looking pretty good from our perspective, but if any relationship is to grow it requires a response – and, of course, how we respond and what we choose to make of the relationship is entirely up to us. Whatever we do, or don’t do, we should be in no doubt that what we make of it, will affect every atom and every moment of our being.

As I move to my new parishes, I will be entering in to new relationships – relationships with people as yet wholly unknown by me, yet held in the same loving embrace of the Creator. It is out of this life-giving love that relationships will begin, and in this life-giving love that relationships will take root, flourish and grow. There will be differences in approach, differences in opinion – what is my way is very probably not always, or even very often, their way. But that’s not a bad thing!

In a book written by Rowan Williams and Joan Chittister, *“For All That Has Been, Thanks: growing a sense of gratitude”*, I am encouraged by these words, and hope you will be, too.

“Division of opinion, too often the fault line of human relationships, is, when we embrace it openly, what invigorates thinking and stirs new thought. It is the ground of new beginnings, the beginning of new insight, the foundation of new respect for the other..... Creativity, it is too often forgotten, comes out of differences. It is the ability to function outside the lines, beyond the dots, despite the boxes and mental chains by which we have forever been constrained, that fits us to be the architects of the future. Instead, we want everyone to think alike when what we really need are people who are thinking newly – about theology, about God, about faith, about morality, about science, about life. “You won’t find this year’s birds in last year’s nests,” the proverb teaches, but we so easily miss the meaning of it entirely. Life is meant for moving on.....”
