Dear Friends,

Unity isn't just for Christmas

Does Christmas already feel like a distant memory? What will you remember most? Was it attending social events celebrating the wonderful story of the nativity, or perhaps, re-uniting with family and friends, sharing a special quality time together?

Feeling 'united' seems to make a huge difference to how we feel and how well we function whether as a family, or as part of a social or community group.

This past year seems to have been riven with disunity at both a national and international level. An obvious example is the war in Ukraine and another, the inability of nations to come together in a united response to the challenge of Climate Change. We can probably all think of many other examples.

Disunity is not, however, a new phenomenon. The apostle, Paul became a key figure in the early development of Christianity a few years after the death and resurrection of Jesus. As he visited embryonic Christian communities, he found arguments raging between factions within them. A major bone of contention was that many Jewish Christians wanted everyone to become Jewish first, before becoming 'fully fledged' Christians. This meant taking on their strict social codes and eating requirements. Perhaps unsurprisingly, those coming to Christianity from other (and typically pagan backgrounds) found this completely unacceptable.

Paul was convinced that arguments of this sort were barriers to the establishment of a successful Church. His advice to the early Christians was clear and unequivocal and might be equally as relevant to the disunity we see around us today.

‘Stop passing judgement on one another’ he told his followers **‘Make every effort to do what leads to peace and to mutual edification.’** (Romans 14)

In leading the development of the early Church, Paul saw the imperative of Christians coming together as a ‘Christian family’ – in which people respected each other’s views and all had a part to play.

‘Be devoted to one another in love,’ he told them. **‘Honour one another above yourselves....be joyful in hope, patient in affliction, faithful in prayer’.**

Let us pray that we may see more of this type of love and mutual respect in our own lives, in public life, and in world affairs, over the coming year.

Our School seeks Governors

Welford Sibbertoft and Sulby Endowed School (WSES) is seeking local people to serve as Governors on its governing body.

Set in the heart of Welford village WSES is a Church of England school and is one of the Peterborough Diocese Education Trust (PDET) family of academies.

The school was rated 'good' by Ofsted last year. They commented on the '*strong sense of community in the school*'. The 2020 SIAMS (Church) inspection also graded the school 'good' noting: '*the welcoming Christian vision is lived out at all levels of the academy*'.

The Academy Governance Committee is made up of parents, staff and others appointed from the community. A key role of Community Governors is to support the community life of the school and its relationship with the wider community, fostering links within the area it serves.

For this important voluntary role:

- *No previous experience is needed
- *Training will be provided
- *There is a time commitment of 6 meetings per year and occasional attendance at school
