Notes from your Parish Council

- There will be a special meeting of the Parish Council Planning Committee to discuss a proposal to build three commercial warehouses on the land on the southern side of the A14 junction of the A5199. Residents are welcome to attend the meeting which will take place at 7.30pm on Wednesday 5th April 2023 in the Village Hall.
- Every year, in every Parish, the Local Parish Council is required, by law to hold a 'Parish Meeting'. Whilst the Parish Council arranges this meeting and provides reports upon Parish matters, it is not a meeting of the Parish Council. It is, specifically, a meeting for Parish residents and community groups to bring up any issue, raise any questions or put forward ideas and proposals in relation to Welford Parish. The Parish Meeting will take place at 7pm on Thursday 27th April in the Village Hall, West Street and will be followed by the regular Parish Council meeting
- The issue of speeding vehicles continues to cause concern. The Parish Council is seeking volunteers to enable a Community Speedwatch team to be set up in the village. The scheme sees fully trained residents use speed detection devices to monitor vehicles travelling through Welford on roads with limits of 20 and 30mph.
- Warning letters are sent to the registered keeper of any vehicles caught exceeding the speed limit, which aims to increase awareness of the dangers of speeding and encourage drivers to reduce their speed.

Welford Wharf

Over the last year some of you may have noticed that the canal side warehouse at Welford wharf has undergone extensive restoration work. This has

been undertaken by a variety of volunteer organisations, financed and supported by the charity Canal and River Trust (CRT). The warehouse was built soon after the Welford Arm was opened in 1814 and is a Grade 2 listed building. The work has been carried out using traditional materials and protecting the original features. The doors and window frames have been sympathetically repaired keeping as much of the original woodwork as possible. Repairs to the drains have also been carried out to help keep the building dry. The project is nearing completion and CRT are holding an open day on April 22 2023 between 10:00am and 3:00pm to give you a chance to look round the building and also to promote a variety of volunteering opportunities available to help them maintain and run the fascinating canal network while learning new skills at the same time. The nearby historic lime kilns are in a sorry state and there are plans to start work to stabilise and restore some of them later this year.

Trees for Welford and Green Welford are holding an event in the Welford pocket park on the same day and it will be running from 10am until 3pm with free activities for children and the young at heart focusing on trees and wildlife habitats.





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

<u>Nature Notes</u>

Whenever the first day of spring is on your calendar it does seem to have arrived! Meteorological spring apparently arrives on March 1st, which even in these times of strange globally warmed climate change seems too early. Harry Secombe used to burst into song on 21st March, declaiming that if he ruled the world, every day would be the first day spring, and on a bright breezy, daffodil filled late March day, who could disagree. We've passed the equinox, daylight now wins, and the seeds in the greenhouse are responding by germinating fast.

We did have some guite dramatic snow after the met bods said it was officially spring, and I had a chest infection - I know lots of other people did too - and I sat by the window watching the birds come to our feeders for some hours. When I did the Great Garden Bird Count I hadn't put the feeders out and was disappointed how few birds I saw. Now I am offering food I was delighted to see the variety that come. Blackbirds, 2 smart yellow beaked males and one female; robins, at least 3; sparrows, - both house and hedge sparrows - lots of those; blue tits, great tits and long tailed tits in considerable numbers; chaffinches, greenfinches, a great spotted woodpecker; a pair of collared doves and the inevitable fat pigeons collecting the seeds dropped from above, and jackdaws - 10 at a time - trying to get at the fat balls and also pecking about in our mossy lawn. A squirrel has been trying hard to access the feast, without much success. Magpies are also about, but fewer than some years. I was delighted to see the first thrush for some time, but sad not to see a wren. They used to be quite common here. The red kite sails over quite often, and the occasional buzzard. Rooks are nesting noisily in the tops of trees. I am now scanning the sky for the arrival of the swallows. There were so few last year and the summer sky would be so empty without them.

The grass is growing fast - I had to mow the lawn the other day - and the fields are full of that other great sign of spring, ewes and their lambs. Farmers report a higher level of single births than usual, but there are lots of strong, healthy lambs skipping about. The blackthorn is flowering so winter will no doubt have another bite, but basically it's a cheery time of year. *Susie Bevin*

The village hall was packed with over 70 people attending the Trees for Welford meeting on March 2nd. We were given a clear message that we should proceed with tree planting in the parish.

There were some important practicalities that we need to resolve around locations in the public spaces in the village, protection of saplings in hedgerows and ongoing watering and maintenance.

We highlighted the implications of the climate crisis on people, wildlife and livestock and the role trees and hedges can play in a future where temperatures are likely to rise.


To quote from our presentation:

" ...in August 1911, a national record was set with the hottest temperature in 79 years—36.7°C. Where? In Raunds, Northamptonshire, just 28 miles away.

In 2022 we felt the first 40° C in UK recorded history. On 19 July the hottest place in the country was Coningsby, Lincolnshire - 40.3° C (in old money that's 104.5°F). Second hottest place recorded 40.2° C - where? Pitsford, just 15 miles away. "

We have been approached by a number of landowners who would like to increase their trees or hedgerow cover and we will work with them to agree the schemes most likely to work in their location.

We are working closely with Harborough Woodland to acquire the skills to organize effective planting work parties and by the time this edition of The Bugle is published, 1,500 hedgerow whips will have been planted



The tree survey conducted last year highlighted the abundance of ash in the landscape. Ash-dieback disease will decimate their numbers. We urgently need to find ways to compensate for this loss.

There was enthusiasm to join our tree survey team for the spring and summer and we welcome more volunteers.

Being so close to the source of the River Avon, a catchment of the Severn, we will explore the possibilities of Natural Flood Management through tree planting to hold back flash flooding.

We will join the national and local Tree Warden schemes to benefit from their expertise and access funding.

Ted Lewis 30.10.1934 - 27.01.2023

Edwin John (Ted) Lewis was born on 30.10.1934 at Hilltop Farm, Normanton Le Heath, near Ashby De La Zouch in Leicestershire. The mixed arable and livestock farm had been farmed by the family for three generations after Ted's great grandfather bought it and moved from Cheshire, walking (driving) his cattle, sheep, and geese all the way. During the 1930s the Coal Board requisitioned most of the land for shallow open cast mining. Although it was reinstated, the land was very poor and Ted's parents struggled to make a good enough living to support him and his three brothers. The farm was sold but the family stayed on as tenants.

As a young man Ted's lifelong love of sport had developed. He was keen on cricket and football, but his first love was boxing, in which he became runner up in the midland ABA lightweight division. He was delighted a few years ago when he met former British champion Jack Bodell at a fight and Jack remembered them training together at the Ibstock boxing club.

Ted told many stories of his life on the farm but one of our favourites was when his Jack Russell disappeared down a badger set. Ted and his brother dug all afternoon and most of the night before they found the poor lifeless dog, which they laid on the grass while they filled the set in again. When they'd almost finished the dog woke up, shot back down the hole, and reappeared the next day as good as new!

Ted met Margaret at a young farmers dance and after they married they took on the farm. Neil and Tim were born and spent their first few years there. In those days there was little traffic and at the age of five Neil would sometimes fetch the cows up the lane in the afternoon for milking.

With a young family to support, Ted eventually gave up the tenancy on the farm and took a job as an animal feed rep in Suffolk - a brave move for someone who'd rarely been away from his own tiny village. He loved his new life and, trundling around in his Austin 1100, he made many friends in the countryside of that beautiful county. Typical of him was when one of his customer friends was critically injured in a road accident, Ted went to his friend's farm before and after work every day for months to help feed his pigs and keep things running until his friend was well again.

In the late 1960s Ted started working for Spillers, based in Wigston, and the family moved to the recently built Wakefield Drive in Welford, before moving in the mid 1970s to West End. Ted was always a farmer at heart and kept all sorts of animals in the little paddock and buildings behind the house. His grandchildren loved it when he'd buy a few Cade lambs for them to help rear. The rest of the family would despair when he brought home Geese that would hiss and chase us if we went near!

Ted and Margaret often holidayed in the Scottish Highlands where one rare bright sunny day they visited Fort William. Dressed in his shorts, tshirt, and sandals he went for a wander around the base of Ben Nevis, only to reappear several hours later telling a worried Margaret, "Well it was a nice day so I thought I might as well go to the top"!

When he retired, Ted bought a few acres of pasture land near Laughton and spent most of his days there, tending his cattle and sheep, visiting markets and nattering to his friends.

Ted was a devoted family man and enjoyed nothing more than spending time with or hearing about his Grandchildren & Great Grandchild.

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
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Jean Netta Tyrrell 30.6.1932 - 5.1.2023

Jean was probably the kindest person you could meet, someone who would always see the best in people. She had many interests, and read the newspapers every day. You could talk to her about most things whether it was about how Leicester City were doing in the Premiership, how many goals Jamie Vardy had scored or about all the changes going on world, good or bad.

Born in 1932, Jean grew up in Welford where the family home had been since the early 1900s. Her parents, Gladys and Roland, ran the village shop selling groceries, petrol and oils that ran well into the 1970s until they retired and the shop closed.

Jean attended Welford Primary School where she made many lifelong friendships. She gained a scholarship for Market Harborough Grammar School in 1943, before going on to secretarial college in Leicester. She joined Barclays Bank in Leicester as a manager's secretary, which would become her lifelong career, working in Leicester and Market Harborough before transferring to the area Head Office in Nottingham. Here she bought a flat for living during the week and would come home to Welford at weekends. In 1983 Jean was asked by Barclays to setup a new charity helping disabled people with work placements. Jean became the Community Relations Manager and was key to setting up this new charity. She was absolutely suited to this role and was presented with a surprise award from Margaret Thatcher at the opening of the charity in 1985.

She sold her flat in Nottingham and came home to Welford to support her mum who was now living on her own after her father Roland died in 1977. When Jean finally retired in 1987 her energy and enthusiasm continued. She became a Barclays Pensioner and a member of the Pensioners Club. A regular highlight was the annual Pensioners Club lunch.

She was an active member of many of the village clubs and associations and was a long-standing member of The Mother's Union, particularly enjoying their many outings. She was a loyal member of the WI, in particular, a keen participant in the monthly competitions. Jean thoroughly enjoyed the many monthly jaunts and holidays that she and fellow WI members regularly went on.

She also helped produce and edit the Welford Parish Council magazine for many years with her good friend John Haynes, putting her secretarial skills to good use.

Although Jean spent most of her life in Welford, she loved travelling and visited places like Austria, Switzerland, Germany, Italy and Cyprus with her old school friends when she was younger. When Jean retired, she celebrated with her mum by going on a P&O Canberra cruise around Spain, Madeira and the Canary Islands and later a cruise up the Rhine.

In later life she loved travelling around England and went on many coach holidays with her brother Richard and close friends from the village. They had a passion for visiting stately homes and gardens and loved spending weeks on the South Coast and in East Anglia.

As you know, church was very important to Jean and for most of her working life she supported the young people in the village teaching at Sunday School when she was home at weekends. Recently, friends have shared their fond memories of the times when Jean taught them there.

Whilst Jean was still happy driving, she would visit her family in Kent and East Sussex and travel to see many of her long-standing friends. She had a keen interest in music and on her many visits to Kent and Sussex, she would love to go to the London musicals and ballet and see her great nieces and nephews in their school plays and dancing shows. She loved to watch the New Year's Day concerts from Vienna, and Alfie Boe and Michael Ball were among her favourite singers.

Once she had given up driving, John Haynes and then George Cottrell took her shopping to Market Harborough. George looked forward to 'Driving Miss Daisy' as he called her and they would often come home via Sibbertoft or Naseby so Jean could enjoy the countryside.

More recently, Jean became a founder member of the Historical Society and was pleased to exercise her phenomenal memory of all things Welford bringing along lots of interesting items relating to the shop and her father's cacti.

Meeting up at the monthly Luncheon Club and the Welcome Club was a real pleasure for Jean and until Covid she regularly enjoyed coffee with friends at their Tuesday coffee mornings.

In 2021 she moved to Sibbertoft Manor as the family home was becoming more and more difficult to upkeep and manage. She continued to attend monthly WI meetings and celebrated her 90th birthday last year.

Jean was a kind, thoughtful and generous lady. She would always be interested in our families and what they were up to, especially the children. She will be sadly missed by everyone in the family and by her many friends in Welford.

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The Suburbanisation of our countryside

As Welford embarks on an ambitious plan to plant more trees, improve habitat, wildlife corridors and water retention to mitigate flooding; there has been a rise in hard fencing and boundaries. Hedges have been ripped out and tree cover reduced. Any hard boundary stops small mammals travelling across gardens. Hedge removal reduces places for nesting birds, and habitat for our smallest mammals, voles, shrews and mice. Hedgehogs are starting to come out from hibernation but now find their runs reduced or lost.

From work on the technical committee of the CPRE we are often acting for people who see the fragile boundaries of hedges and trees diminished. This is a plea for our own villagers to think twice before putting up any more hard landscaping.

It is difficult to pursue the plans for improving tree cover if we have a simultaneous reduction of flora and fauna. The Welford neighbourhood plan clearly supports biodiversity and the conservation areas help to enforce this policy. There is also a policy to make green buffer zones between properties, not reduce them.

Villages are placed in the countryside which have normally quite leafy boundaries, especially if adjacent to fields where hedge and ditch are the whole boundary line and remain in ownership of the landowner. The ditches help water drainage and should not be encroached upon and used as garden extensions. Where these boundaries have been compromised they could be seen to be in breach of the Countryside Act. If in doubt contact a solicitor or the Parish council for advice.

Boundaries are always a sensitive area but they are not definitive lines. They are places of habitat as well for nesting birds and small mammals so the greater the width, the better for biodiversity.

Extracts from the eulogy for the funeral of Cliff Hayhurst on 16 February 2023

My dad, Cliff Hayhurst, loved living in Welford. Before he came here, he got restless every few years and wanted to move on. But that didn't happen in Welford.

Cliff brought his family to Rosemary Cottage, in West Street, more than 50 years ago and he was determined to end his days here. Welford was where he realised his dream of a studio pottery. He spent many hours fixing the house and garden. He and his wife Phyllis enjoyed exploring the local countryside and contributing to village organisations.

But Welford was a long way from Cliff's roots. His family was originally from Lancashire and he was born in 1929 in Nottingham. He said he didn't enjoy school much, apart from his favourite subject, art. But did have a lucky break at 16, when he joined a small furniture company.

At the time, the furniture industry arranged for apprentices to spend two days a week at a technical college. Cliff joined courses at Nottingham College of Art and he added evening classes – enough to get a full art school diploma. His long career in art and design was born.

Just after this, Cliff met Phyllis at Gilbert's Dance Hall in Nottingham. This was the start of a romance spanning more than 70 years. As well as enjoying dancing, they were both keen cyclists. A quick Sunday afternoon spin would be the 16 miles from Nottingham to Derby and then back in time for tea.

They married in 1954 when Cliff was appointed as a designer in Birmingham with one of the country's biggest paint companies. It was his job to decide which colours should be used in large public buildings all over the country.

Cliff and Phyllis later moved to Hagley, a village in Worcestershire. The house had been empty for two years and had an overgrown garden about 100 meters long. They replaced floors, laid drains, built a garage, extended a bedroom, and created productive fruit and vegetable plots, all the time holding down jobs and bringing up two children.

Then Cliff got itchy feet. He applied and got a job as a designer with the Midland area museum service. This involved creating exhibitions at around 15 museums and galleries. He once described it as the most satisfying job he'd ever had. At Birmingham Museum, he designed a gallery for a collection of vast stone buddhas. He must have been very proud of this because he took us to see it every school holiday.

Four years later, his feet started to itch again and he decided to change direction once more. He did a threeyear training course to become an art and design teacher. Money was suddenly much tighter. But Cliff had ingenious ways of getting round this. We didn't have a television but he built a receiver that could broadcast TV sound. Then he taught us how to use binoculars so that we could watch the programmes being shown in the house across the road.

Cliff's first teaching job was at an upper school at Desford in Leicestershire. Here, he discovered pottery for the first time, and lots of new ideas about art education. Three years later, he was appointed head of a new design department at Robert Smythe school in Market Harborough. He put his new ideas into practice, offering courses in film-making, photography and, of course, pottery.

Not all the members of his team accepted these changes. Cliff had a folder in which he collected the blocking tactics of one of his colleagues. In 1978, after another row with this teacher, he said to himself:

"I've had enough of this. I'll be a potter. I can do this, enjoy it and no-one can argue with me."

He marched down to the headmaster's office and resigned.

The family had been living in Rosemary Cottage for about six years by then. The outbuildings made it a perfect place for a small business. And so Rosemary Cottage Studio went into production. Cliff made hundreds of mugs, vases, plates and pottery animals. If you walk round Welford, you'll still see house numbers made in his studio.

It was a settled and enjoyable time. Cliff and Phyllis sharpened up their dancing skills and passed exams. They bought a camper van and toured the country, discovering new special places and revisiting old favourites. They visited my brother, Stephen and his family in Denmark.

But there were very sad times too. In 1998, Stephen died, aged 35, following treatment for brain cancer. It was a huge blow that took many years to come to terms with. Cliff and Phyllis wanted to celebrate Stephen's life and one way they did this was through Welford Pocket Park. They planted a grove of silver birch trees in Stephen's memory and joined the group set up to look after the park.

As the century turned, Cliff began to wind down the pottery. He spent more of his time painting in water colours, experimenting with digital photography, reshaping the garden and creating a model railway in his



workshop.

One of his weekly highlights was Dancing for Fun, the sessions he and Phyllis ran in the village hall, up until the covid lockdown. They also hosted a monthly tea-dance which attracted people from Welford and beyond.

Cliff joined the table tennis club and served on the village hall committee. He loved a good discussion at the monthly Good Neighbours coffee morning.

He was particularly passionate about good design and construction. He was never more frustrated than when something broke and he couldn't fix it. For many months, there was a lawn mower in his workshop which he just refused to give up on.

And if you've ever been in the workshop, you'll know that Cliff had tools for every imaginable job, all in their designated place – although only he knew where this was.

Cliff learned the traditional techniques for everything from pottery and painting to gardening and bricklaying. And then he'd work out what he thought was a better way to do it.

He was fiercely independent and loved the idea of setting off in the camper van with Phyllis, not knowing quite where they'd end up.

The family thanks everyone who came to the service at St Mary's in Welford and joined them afterwards in the village hall to remember Cliff's life. A fantastic £381.75 has been raised to support the work of Shelter.
